BOSTON REGION MPO STUDIES POTENTIAL TRAIL EXTENSION FROM SUDBURY TO FRAMINGHAM

A new corridor for bicycle and pedestrian traffic is taking shape. It has the potential to link communities in the Boston Region Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) area to communities to the north and to the regional bicycle trail network. Construction is set to begin this fall on the northernmost section of the Bruce N. Freeman Memorial Bike Path. This first section extends nearly seven miles from the Lowell-Chelmsford

line to Westford. If completed as planned, the entire trail will be a 25-mile-long multiuse trail that will eventually traverse the communities of Westford, Carlisle, Acton, Concord, Sudbury, and possibly Framingham.

The MPO recently conducted a study, at the request of the towns of Framingham and Sudbury, on the benefits and costs of extending the path nearly five miles to the south on the South Sudbury Industrial Track, part of a rail line that has not been in use since freight service was terminated in 2000. CSX Transportation Inc. currently owns the right-of-way that

extends from near Route 20 in Sudbury to near Route 9 in Framingham.

The MPO received input from a task force composed of representatives from the MetroWest Growth Management Committee, the Executive Office of Transportation, the Metropolitan Area Planning Council (MAPC), the Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR), and the towns of Framingham and Sudbury.

Smart Growth Developments Moving Forward in Cambridge and Somerville

NEW VISION FOR LECHMERE STATION WITH FOCUS ON TRANSIT-ORIENTED DEVELOPMENT

The design phase is underway for a new MBTA Green Line station and busway that will be constructed as part of the next phase of the NorthPoint development in Cambridge, a \$2.6 billion transit-oriented-development project on the site of a 45-acre former rail yard in Cambridge, Boston (Charlestown), and Somerville.

On October 23, MBTA officials, and NorthPoint development partners PanAm Systems and Jones Lang LaSalle, unveiled concept plans for a new multimodal station to replace the existing Lechmere stop, which will be relocated to the east side of McGrath/O'Brien Highway. The new station, which will include an elevated Green Line station and a surface busway, will be a key factor in providing car-free access to what will be a new walkable community, modeled on the principles of smart growth, where homes, offices, shops, and restaurants are in close proximity to each other and to public transit. The master plan for the site includes 2,700 homes, 2.2 million square feet of commercial space, and 10 acres of open space and parkland.

Construction began last March on the project's first phase, which includes the construction of two residential buildings and a five-acre park.

Under the partnership agreement with the MBTA, the NorthPoint developers will design, build, and maintain the new station for 10 years. MBTA officials report that design of the new station will be completed following a community and agency review process next year. Station construction is anticipated to begin by 2008.

MIXED-USE DISTRICT PLANNED FOR ASSEMBLY SQUARE

The revitalization of Somerville's Assembly Square came one step closer to fruition on October 17, when Mayor Joseph A. Curtatone announced an agreement between the major parties involved in an urban renewal project that will create a transit-oriented business, shopping, entertainment, and residential district along the Mystic River.

The City of Somerville, the Mystic View Task Force (a citizen's group), Federal Realty Investment Trust, and Swedish retailer IKEA have

come to an agreement on a vision for developing Assembly Square using smart growth principles.

More than 10 million square feet of interior space will be developed, including 5 million square feet of office space and research and development space, 1.4 million square feet of retail space, and approximately 3 million square feet of residential space.

City and development planners envision a new MBTA Orange Line subway station that would provide a transit link to Assembly Square. Federal Realty Investment Trust and IKEA have offered to contribute \$15 million toward the design and construction costs of the station to supplement \$25 million of earmark funds from the federal New Start program.

Walking routes and a bicycle path through the area are also being planned; they will provide nonmotorized access to Somerville neighborhoods.

chusetts Environmental Policy Act Unit (MEPA) of the Executive Office of Environmental Affairs on the proposed Green Line extension to Somerville and Medford.

At EOT's request, MEPA has extended the comment period to November 24. Boston Region MPO Activities

BOSTON REGION MPO ACTION ITEMS

The MPO's Transportation Planning and Programming Committee voted to distribute an adjustment to the fiscal years 2007–2010 Transportation Improvement Program for a 15-day review period. The adjustment incorporates changes that reflect federal programming requirements for high-priority projects and carryover transit funding in the FY 2007 element, and identifies funding for a parking study in East Milton and for commuter rail improvements on the Haverhill/Reading Line. The Committee also approved *Mid-North Shore Subregional Transportation Study* and "Newton Corner Rotary Study," two MPO work products that will be highlighted in the next issue of *TRANSREPORT*.

REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION ADVISORY COUNCIL UPDATE

At their October meeting, Metropolitan Area Planning Council staff briefed the Advisory Council on the preferred land-use scenario for JOURNEY TO 2030, the MPO's long-range transportation plan.

ACCESS ADVISORY COMMITTEE TO THE MBTA (AACT) UPDATE

In October MBTA Design and Construction Project Manager Tikam Matai provided AACT members with

an overview of proposed plans for reconstruction of Brookline Village Station on the D Branch of the Green Line. Most of the work for the station renovation will consist of raising the existing platform and creating obstruction-free boarding areas for the MBTA's low-floor trolley cars. Other modifications that will bring the station into compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act include:

- The installation of Braille/tactile signage to

identify the station, and tactile warning strips along the edges of the platforms

- The creation of mini-high platforms at one end of each platform to provide access to older vehicles

The MBTA's Office for Transportation Access reported that production of 155 new emission-controlled diesel buses (whose features AACT inspected in August) has begun, with shipment of the first 23 buses expected in November.

Alternative-Fuel Milestones Achieved

The Massachusetts Bay Transportation Authority (MBTA) and the Massachusetts Port Authority (Massport) are two MPO member agencies that were feted at the AltWheels Transportation Festival, held September 22–24, for their accomplishments in improving air quality through the use of clean-fuel vehicles.

The MBTA, which is the state's largest alternative-fuel user, won the 2006 AltWheels/Massachusetts Clean Cities award for significantly reducing exhaust emissions from its bus fleet. The MBTA currently operates compressed-natural-gas (CNG) buses on the Silver Line and on some bus routes. In addition, 193 emission-controlled-diesel (ECD) buses are already in operation throughout the system and 155 more new ECD buses are expected to begin arriving in November.

Massport, whose fleet of 33 CNG-powered shuttle buses recently surpassed their 10

millionth "Clean Mile" of service, also participated in the AltWheels festival, by taking part in an "alt fuel" caravan to MIT and providing two CNG-powered buses to transport festival participants. Massport's shuttle buses carry passengers between Logan Airport terminals, the MBTA's Airport Station, and the Logan Water Shuttle Dock. They log up to 4,440 miles and consume 36,000 gallons of CNG fuel per month.

Another milestone for improved local air quality was celebrated at the MBTA's Albany Street Garage on October 13, where the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency held a press conference to announce the availability of ultra-low-sulphur diesel (ULSD) fuel to consumers at fueling stations nationwide. ULSD fuel contains 97 percent less sulphur than the diesel fuel previously available to consumers.
